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ACCUSED IN SHABAD SIX-MURDER CASE, RAJKUMAR, FOUND DEAD!



- Body discovered in Penjarla, Kothur Mandal
- Poison bottle found next to the body
- Police preliminarily conclude it was a suicide
- Police reached the scene following information from locals
- Poison bottle found near the body

Meanwhile, higher authorities suspended T. Ramesh, the Shahabad Sub-Inspector (SI) investigating the POCSO case, after the victims' family alleged negligence in handling their complaint regarding the threat to their lives posed by the accused.

Rangareddy / Hyderabad: B.

Rajkumar (29), the accused who had been on the run for two days after brutally murdering six people—including his wife and two children—in Ranga Reddy district, was found dead on Monday. Locals spotted his body at a real estate venture near Penjarla in Kothur Mandal, on the outskirts of Hyderabad, and alerted the police. This village is reportedly his

maternal uncle's hometown.

Future City Police

Commissioner Tarun Joshi and other senior officials arrived at the scene and confirmed the deceased's identity as Rajkumar. Given the presence of a poison bottle near the body, the police preliminarily suspect suicide. The body has been shifted for a post-mortem examination, and an investigation is underway.

Rajkumar committed these gruesome murders in Shabad Mandal on the night of July 10. He stabbed and slit the throats of a 17-year-old girl (who had filed a POCSO case against him), her mother, and her grandmother, as well as his own wife, Saritha, and their two sons. After committing the murders, he called his father to inform him of the incident and stated that he was going to end his own life as well. Police suspect that the atrocity was committed out of a grudge over the filing of a POCSO case against the accused; he had secured anticipatory bail in that case just last month. Following the murders, the police launched a massive manhunt for Raj Kumar and announced a reward of ₹2 lakh for information leading to his whereabouts.

Kothagudem Dist: On Monday, the Telangana BJP launched the 'Singareni Bharosa Yatra' to inform the public about the Central Government's decision to allocate the Tadicherla-2 coal block to Singareni Collieries Company Limited (SCCL). Union Minister for Coal and Mines G. Kishan Reddy, BJP State President N. Ramchander Rao, and other leaders flagged off the two-day yatra from the party's state office in Hyderabad. Upon their subsequent arrival in Khammam district, they received a grand welcome from party cadres.

BJP leaders stated that, as part of the yatra, they would meet Singareni mine workers across four districts and explain the measures taken by the Central Government for the organization's development. Ramchander Rao noted that the allocation of the Tadicherla-2 coal block would strengthen Singareni's long-term economic growth and boost the confidence of the workers.

Speaking before the yatra began, Ramchander Rao alleged that both the previous BRS government and the current Congress government had neglected Singareni. He stated that this neglect was the reason the public sector undertaking was facing financial difficulties. Meanwhile, it was stated that the Central Government, under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, is making efforts to strengthen Singareni.

Speaking on the occasion, Union Minister Kishan Reddy described the allocation of the Tadicherla-2 coal block to Singareni as a historic decision. He explained that although Supreme Court rulings mandate the allocation of coal blocks through auctions, Prime Minister Modi made the specific decision to allocate this block to Singareni after examining legal avenues and seeking legal counsel. He added that he had secured this allocation after discussing the matter with the Prime Minister, following requests from trade unions.

A police officer, whose duty is to uphold the law, faced severe criticism for acting irresponsibly. After a video of the incident went viral on social media, senior officials took action and registered a criminal case against the Sub-Inspector.

road, which falls under the Narsingi police station limits. Fellow motorists were shocked to see a young child driving the car on that busy route. They intercepted the vehicle and confronted the SI, questioning why he was endangering lives by handing the steering wheel to a small child.

When the child remarked, "My grandfather is a police officer," SI Tirupati attempted to justify his actions by claiming, "It is an automatic car; it is under my control." This led to an argument between the motorists and the officer. Someone recorded the incident and posted it on social media, where it quickly went viral.

Senior officials took a serious view of the matter after the video came to their attention. Cyberabad police officially announced on Sunday night that a case has been registered at the Narsingi Police Station against Sub-Inspector (SI) Tirupati under Section 125 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and Sections 184 and 180 of the Motor Vehicles Act for offenses such as handing over a vehicle to a minor and endangering the lives of others.

“Commotion in Hyderabad... 500 voter ID cards found on the road!”

In an incident that caused a stir in Hyderabad, over 500 voter ID cards were found abandoned on the road. The incident occurred on Monday on the Jalpally road, near Jalpally Forest Park, within the limits of the Pahadi Sharif police station.

Locals who noticed a suspicious bag lying on the road alerted the media. Police immediately arrived at the scene and seized the bag. Upon inspection, it was found that the majority of the voter cards belonged to the Chandrayangutta Assembly constituency. The police stated that a case has been registered and an investigation is underway.

Locals outraged over officials' negligence; demand inquiry.

This incident has sparked serious concern, as it coincides with the Special Summary Revision (SSR) of the electoral rolls in Telangana. Locals are expressing anger that hundreds of cards were discarded on the road while many people are still awaiting the delivery of their voter cards. They allege that the incident clearly reflects official negligence in handling crucial documents.

Locals are demanding a thorough investigation, strict action against those responsible, and the immediate delivery of the cards to their rightful owners. Currently, a door-to-door voter survey is being conducted in the state until July 24, with the draft electoral roll scheduled for release on July 31. Against this backdrop, the incident raises serious questions regarding the functioning of the authorities.
